Urban Man Unhurt As Car Hits Train

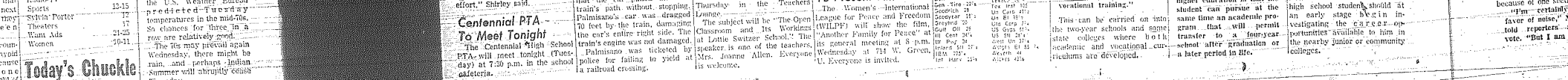
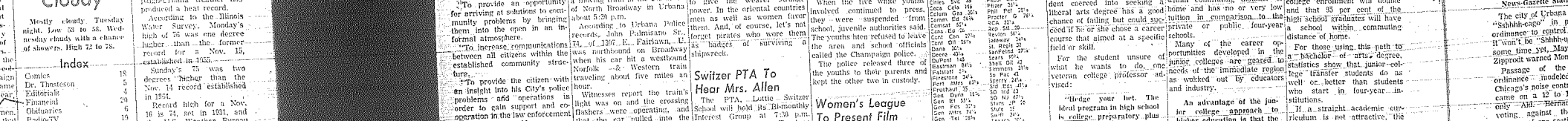
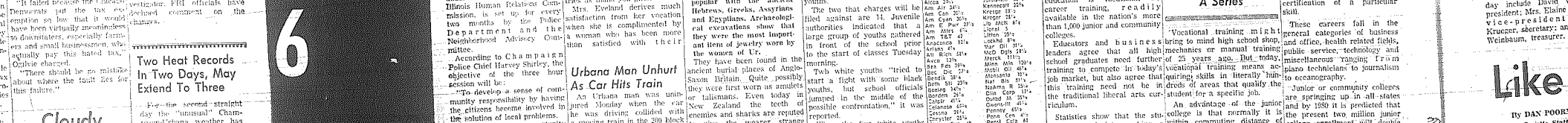
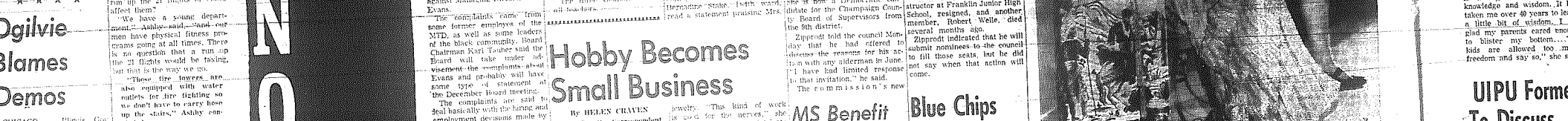
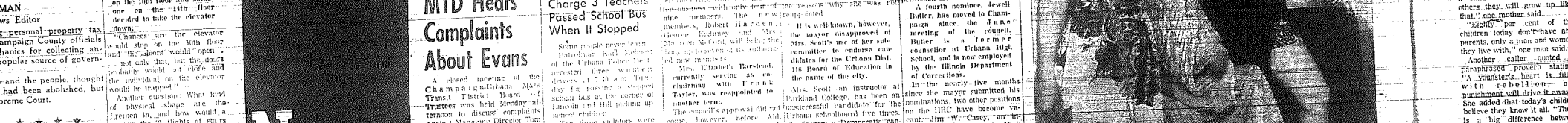
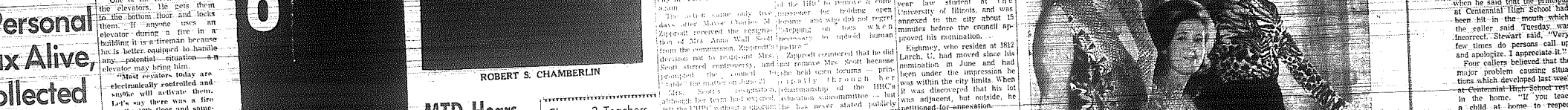

Career Training Gains Prominence

Many of the career programs are spreading up in all states and by 1980 it is predicted that the present two million junior college enrollment will double and that 25 per cent of the high school graduates will have a school within commuting distance of home.

For those using this path, statistics show that junior-college transfer students do as well or better than students who start in four-year institutions.

If a straight academic curriculum is not attractive, the high school student should at an early stage begin investigating the career opportunities available to him in the nearby junior or community colleges.

Second Of A Series

Vocational training might bring to mind high school shop, but that is not necessarily so. Vocational training might include anything from auto mechanics to journalism to technology.

An advantage of the junior college is that normally it is within commuting distance of home and has no or very low tuition in comparison to the private or public four-year schools.

Many of the career opportunities developed in the junior colleges are geared in needs of the immediate region and are worked out by educators and industry.

An advantage of the junior college approach to higher education is that the student can pursue at the same time an academic program that will permit transfer to a four-year school after graduation or a later period in life.
