On the evils of modern warfare. Modern warfare has a great many evils, some of which I will name. First in importance is the destruction of human life, occasioned by wars; in the wars of Napoleon Bonaparte 6,000,000, of human beings are supposed, at the least estimate, to have perished (probably ^{the} greater number is greater perished) in the wars of other generals. great numbers have been slain.

Military affairs are always attended with great expense. The Revolutionary war cost the sum of \$135,193,703. Even in the time of peace, this expense continues to last; in the year ending June 30th (according to the report of the Secretary of War) this expense was in round numbers \$4,300,000.
