

CIVIL WAR VET OF PENFIELD ANSWERS CALL

Penfield, Feb. 16.—Henry Clay Bear died at his home here at 6 o'clock this morning of a paralytic stroke.

Funeral services have not been arranged yet but it will probably be Friday.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. E. W. Hadden of Penfield, and two grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

He was born Dec. 7, 1833 at Mt. Rock, Pa., and came to Illinois with his parents in 1853 and settled on a farm near Oakley. He was mar-

ried to Lucetta Likens on Nov. 17, 1859, and soon after he enlisted for Civil war in Company A, 116th Infantry, and on June 1, 1865 was given honorable discharge. He was severely wounded at Vicksburg. He returned here and took up farming. He moved to a farm near here in the spring of 1869 where he lived until 1881, then moving to Penfield where he entered the grain company which still bears his name. Mrs. Bear died a year ago.

He was a member of the Knights of Pythias for 40 years. He served as supervisor of township and justice of peace.

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
