Supreme Court Rules Against Segregation

WASHINGTON (AP) The Su-
preme Court Monday ruled unani-
mously in the segregation cases
that the doctrine of separate but
equal facilities has no place in
public education.

Chief Justice Warren, reading
the court's opinion, said that to
separate children solely because
of race, generates feelings in their
hearts and minds which might
never be undone.

INDIANA POLICE KILL DILLINGER GANG MEMBER

BEDFORD, Ind. (AP) Clyde Al-
fred Steinbarger, who state police
said was a member of the notori-
ous Dillinger gang, was shot to
death Sunday night trying to es-
cape a police ambush in a Lees-
ville, Ind., general store.

The 36-year-old Steinbarger,
whose 30-year police record was
studded with safe-rackings, bur-
glaries and armed robberies, was
fatally torn by a shotgun blast in
the darkened store 14 miles east
of here.

State police had lain in wait in-
side the store for nearly a week
after Wayne Armstrong, the own-
er, had reported becoming suspi-
cious of two men who came in to
buy a flashlight. He identified
Steinbarger from state police pic-
tures.

The state police said the two
had broken in a front door. When
ordered to surrender, officers re-
ported, both tried to escape.

And, if advance threats are car-
ried out, the ruling will lead
eventually to the abolition of pub-
lic school systems, as they now
exist in South Carolina, Georgia
and Virginia.

Warren said that because of the
complex questions involved, the
formulation of Supreme Court de-
crees backing up the ruling will
be delayed.

But, he declared, "We have an-
nounced that segregation has no
place in education."

Warren went on to say that in
order to have full assistance of
all the parties concerned, the
cases will be restored to the
court's docket and that new argu-
ments will be heard on two ques-
tions asked by the tribunal before
it heard its second arguments of
the issues last December.

One of these questions involved
the time issue, that is, when to
order schools in states which now
require segregation to admit Ne-
gro children along with white chil-
dren.

The other question raised the
issue of whether the court should
appoint a special master to rec-
ommend specific terms for its de-
crees, or whether the cases should
be sent back to lower Federal
courts to see that segregation
and practices are ended.
