Lesson 3 – Serving America in the War

Length: 1-2 class periods

Set-up: Groups of 2 - 4

Procedures:

- Review as a class student responses to the previous lesson's question of what American men and women might have thought about WWI.
- Pass out to each group the Letter Response Sheet and one copy of each of the following documents: <u>A Letter from Bob Huff</u>, Letters From Our Boys in France, Letters from Soldiers at Home and Abroad, <u>WWI Soldier Photo</u>, <u>Letters from a WWI Nurse (Nettie Irle)</u>, and <u>Letters from a WWI Nurse (Nettie Irle) Transcripts</u>.
- In their groups, students should read through the letters from a WWI nurse and soldiers and fill out the Letter Response Sheet.
- Discuss the documents as a class
 - What did students find the most interesting?
 - What did students find the most surprising?
 - Were the letters all about the war or did the soldiers and the nurse talk about other things?
 - Do students think the soldiers and the nurse left anything about the war out of their letters? Why/why not?
 - What did American men and women really feel about serving in WWI?
 - Had the students lived in 1917 or 1918, would they have joined the war effort as a soldier or a nurse?
- Spend time reviewing what students have learned about WWI and Americans' service in the war.

Local Primary Sources: Students will view letters from World War I soldiers printed in the *Champaign-Urbana Courier*, letters from a World War I nurse (Nettie Irle) that her family kept, and photos of local soldiers and Nettie Irle. **Assessment:** Students will have completed the <u>Letter Response Sheet</u> based on the letters and used their knowledge of WWI and understanding of the letters to participate in a class discussion about American men and women who went off to World War I.
